Birdathon 18 December 2016

This was inspired by a country-wide 24 hour birdathon with the aim of raising money to donate to the Hutton Shearwater Trust in Kaikoura. None of us had 24 hours to devote, so we aimed to see how many birds we could find in the time we had.

I met Sandra and Eleanor at Woodend at 8:30 am, then headed towards Amberley. Our first bird on the list was Starling, followed closely by a House Sparrow. We decided to take a detour via Kaiapoi Pa Road to see if we could get Little Owl. Along the road we saw California Quail. We stopped the car near where Little Owl have been seen before and one was sitting there, but by the time the other two were able to get a clear view it had disappeared. We got out of the car and walked around the tree but no sign of the bird. Well, never mind, off we went on another detour along Factory Road, where we managed to see **Peafowl** (2, a male and a female). Next, we made a quick stop at Saltwater Creek to see if we might see Kingfishers or the White Heron that had been there recently, but no luck.

We arrived at the Waipara Estuary at 9:40 am and added Greenfinch, Goldfinch, Chaffinch, Feral Pigeon, Welcome Swallow, Yellowhammer, Skylark, Silvereye, Thrush, Blackbird, Black-billed Gull, Black-backed Gull, Banded Dotterel, Pied Stilt, Pied Oystercatcher, Paradise Shelduck, Mallard, Shoveler, Grey Teal, Pied Shag, Little Shag, Caspian Tern, White-f ronted Tern, Black-f ronted Tern, and Spur-winged Plover. No sign of the Blackfronted Dotterel we had hoped to see. No birds were seen out at sea other than Black-backed Gulls and White-fronted Terns.

Back to the Amberley Beach Walkway where we added **Dunnock, Fantail, Grey Warbler, Redpoll** and **Bellbird** (a juvenile with a very strange polleny head having a bath).

11:40 am saw us back at the Ashley Estuary.

There was a strong N.W wind blowing now that made conditions very difficult for viewing. We checked out the South end of the estuary where we added Bar-tailed Godwit, White-faced Heron, Black Swan, Variable Oystercatcher, Canada Goose and Wrybill to the list. We were able to see a large gathering of Spotted Shags up near the river mouth, and a Royal Spoonbill. A stop at Taranaki Wetlands saw us find Pukeko, Coot, Harrier, Scaup and Little Black Shag. A Kingfisher was heard calling, then seen.

We took another drive along Kaiapoi Pa Road to see it we could see the **Little Owl**. It wasn't in the tree but we were able to see one sitting on a heap of Pine tree branches. Very well camouflaged. Nine **Mute Swan** were seen at Pegasus Wetland, also **Magpie**. Missed out seeing the Feral Geese that are usually in the northern ponds.

By now it was 1:50 pm so we decided to head to Lake Ellesmere and try to see some migrant waders. Another Little Owl was seen while driving along Davidsons Road. Red-necked Stint, Pacific Golden Plover, Curlew Sandpiper, Pectoral Sandpiper and the Cox's Sandpiper were added to the list after a good walk from Embankment Road. Three Black Shags were seen standing on posts out in the lake.

By now it was near 5 o'clock and I was thinking of all the things I needed to do before helping host the family for a pre Christmas do tomorrow so headed for home. We added one more species, **Red-billed Gull**, as we drove through Hornby, to make our total 58. Not bad.

All in all it was a very enjoyable day. We spent nine hours looking, travelled 180 km and saw most of the birds on our target list. With a little more luck and travelling a little further I think we could have added another ten species.

Yes, I would do it again. It's a real challenge to make sure all the team see or hear the bird.

Marj Davis Bequest

The committee is seeking members' feedback on funding priorities for the Marj Davis bequest. At the AGM in March 2014, it was agreed that after paying for the plates in the new *Field Guide*, the remaining capital should be retained and that interest on the money should be disbursed annually. Since then the income has exceeded disbursements by a considerable margin. This can be seen in the following table.

The student member development refers to support for attendance at a course at Miranda in 2014 and the Birds NZ youth camps in 2015 and 2016. This is in line with early discussions about what the fund could be used for. There have been some other proposals considered by the committee but these have been deemed inappropriate or in one case the applicant was able to fund their proposal in another way.

The committee's aim is to distribute the income from the bequest (currently around \$2,000 per

annum) in ways that will promote the study and welfare of birds and their habitat in Canterbury. In December, we met to review the management of the bequest and identified several areas where the money might be spent. We wish to discuss these at the AGM in March and are raising them now so that members can think about them in advance.

The proposals are as follows.

Canterbury birding activities In line with Marj's own interests, we could use the money to fund Canterbury Regional research projects carried out collectively by the membership. Depending on the projects, this could require some members being willing to make an ongoing time commitment. We could subsidise weekends away for members to study the birds in a particular area. We could also subsidise birding trips for members (eg Kaikoura pelagic). However, the committee felt that priority should be given to activities that produced a useful tangible result like a survey.

Student birder support We would like to continue to support student birders in taking up training and other development opportunities. We would like to encourage more young people to become involved including current members and young people who are not yet members. We would like to identify further development opportunities for student birders.

Independent research We could establish a research fund to contribute to relevant research in Canterbury. For example, we could make \$1,000 available every year or two. Applicants could be limited to university students who would provide a summary research proposal and budget.

Bird habitat restoration We could support conservation projects that improved bird habitat, for example through the erection of predator proof fences and/or reforestation.

Canterbury Field Course We could run a field course in and around Christchurch that would involve studying the wide variety of habitats and species in the area from shared accommodation in a central location.

Buying kit This idea did not have a lot of support but it is included for completeness. We could buy some gear for the use of members.

For example, scopes, cameras or recorders. The reason this wasn't popular was because of the practical problems. Where would the gear be kept? Who would chase people up if it wasn't returned? Who would pay if the gear was damaged?

The trust deed did not specify any purpose for which the money had been gifted however the fact that it was gifted to the Canterbury Region leads the committee to a strong view that a priority in spending the money should be a Canterbury focus. It is of note that Marj bequeathed money to several national charities, but always to the local branch.

The committee looks forward to discussing these proposals, and any other ideas members might have, at the March AGM. Please feel free to put any thoughts in an email to the committee, prior to this, and email it to Jan. A summary of any suggestions received will be circulated prior to the AGM.

Recent Happenings

November was a busy month for members, with two fieldtrips and meetings being held, as well as a ramble.

Our first event of the month was a very interesting talk from Mailee Stanbury about the work she did for DOC monitoring Fairy Terns at Mangawhai in the summer of 2015. Her work involved monitoring nests and recording information, such as when the parent birds were on the nest, how much chicks were fed and how much they actually ate. Currently, the Fairy Tern population is comprised of forty three birds, so the success of each breeding season is crucial to the survival of the population.

Next up was the Ashley/Rakahuri River bird survey, which had to be postponed by two

weeks due to the high water level. Nearly all species were down on the long term averages, which is disappointing to see. This decrease was suggested to be due to an increase of weeds on the river and the very high water levels.

A ramble to Pegasus Wetlands turned up the usual variety of bird species. It is nice to see the population of Mute Swans there increasing, with nine being recorded. An observation was made about the relatively small number of Australian Shovelers compared to normal, with just eight counted.

Lake Ellesmere's annual summer wader count turned up few migrant waders on most sections of the lake, although the area between Jarvis and Embankment Road was full of them. This included seventeen Pacific Golden Plover, thirteen Sharp-tailed and four Curlew Sandpipers, fourteen Red-necked Stints, three Knots and twelve Turnstones. Wrybill and Banded Dotterel were also seen there. In other sections of the lake a Gull-billed Tern, another twenty six Red-necked Stints, and two more Knots were found. For the full results of the count, please refer to the spreadsheet attached at the back of this newsletter.

Our last activity for the year was a talk by Yvonne Curtis, who spoke about a trip she took through Zimbabwe and Botswana. While not an experience for the faint hearted, it turned up some stunning looking birds and other wildlife. Yvonne's photographs provided members with some good discussions about identification.

Birds NZ Conference and AGM 2017

The NZ Bird Conference and AGM will be held in Te Anau on Queen's Birthday Weekend, from the third to the fifth of June.

The conference again aims to continue the fine work of previous conferences in making this the premier New Zealand event for the communication of new research findings on New Zealand birds, with two days largely being devoted to scientific presentations, while also providing opportunity for discussion and networking and between bird researchers and birders in New Zealand. A variety of workshops are planned for the Sunday morning, which include banding, wader identification, use of eBird, and reporting unusual birds.

The field trips on the Monday look very exciting with a choice of a visit to Lake Orbell and Takahe Valley, exploring the Milford Road, tramping the Kelper to Iris Burn (and back) and to Awarua Bay. Useful Birding Websites

If you're fairly new to birding, you might wonder how other birders know about so many different and exciting places to go birding, how they always seem to know when a rare bird has been spotted, or how they build up their ID skills. You can look in a field guide or other book, but there are three online sites that are really helpful.

One is the discussion group birdingnz.net where people post their more interesting sightings and ask for identification help. A quick look at that every day or two will give you a good idea if there are any interesting birds in your area. The site also lets your sign up to receive text notifications about any especially rare birds that are reported.

Ebird (http://ebird.org/content/ebird/) is another very useful site. Birders worldwide use it to record all their sightings, and you can use it to help plan your birding trips. One way is to open the explore data tab and click on 'explore a region'. Type in Canterbury New Zealand, then continue to the recent visits tab. You can then see all the places that have recently been visited and a full list of the birds seen during each visit.

Another way is to click on the 'species maps' tab and enter the species you want to see and the region you want to see it in. You can then zoom in on an area to find exactly where it was seen. A third option is to click on the 'explore hotspots' tab, which allows you to enter the name of a country, area, or particular location. This can be especially handy when you are visiting a new area. These are just a few of the ways you can use ebird.

A third useful tool is the New Zealand Birds Online encyclopedia (http://nzbirdsonline.org.nz/). You can search for a particular bird, which is helpful when you want to look at photos and ID tips of a species you are unfamiliar with but hoping to see. You

can also use it to help you ID a bird you have

already seen but are unsure exactly what it is.

Hawksbury Lagoon

I was accused of being a Twitcher last week. One of those camo clad middle aged/elderly men with long lenses, who, in the pursuit of rare birds, brave the perils of First World highways in their 4x4 Outlandish Subarus. Subsisting on minimal rations of hastily consumed MacDonald's washed down with Coke, they hit the road at 2am, are in situ by dawn. Mission accomplished well before the sun's above the yardarm, they return to base and clock in at work by 8.30am, another life, year, country, county, patch, month, week, ebird tick under their belts.

It was a completely spurious accusation of course. True I braved SH1 on the tortuous route across the Kilmog from Waitati to that birding hotspot Hawksbury Lagoon and I did so after a paltry breakfast of porridge, coffee and toast.

But it was just pure coincidence that a rare bird had been photographed on the lagoon the day before I was scheduled to resume the quarterly counts of the Lagoon; one of my many ornithological New Year's resolutions. I'd also like to point out that my transport is a 20 year old small cheap 2x2 early Korean model car and my long lens is a so called bridge camera, which claims to have a 50x zoom but takes so long to focus, if indeed it ever does, that any ornithological subject, be it rare or no, has long flown the frame.

Add to that the fact that I dutifully counted all the wildfowl on the Lagoon and assiduously noted down the passerines both alien and native and well I rest my case. Just for the record there were 36 Royal Spoonbill; 303 Black Swan; 83 Canada Geese; 690 Mallard/Grey Duck (note I am not claiming Mallard as a tick); 101 Shoveler; 675 Grey Teal and 167 Pied Stilt. Not to mention 28 House Sparrows, 12 Goldfinches and a single Tui and Fantail. Not the sort of application a mere Twitcher would exhibit.

You can look up the full list on eBird. Not a "rare" in sight.

The bloody thing had upped and flown to Karitane. It must have heard I was coming. If only on my way back, I'd turned left off the hazardous SH1 onto the pleasant rural road to Karitane, I'd have been able to tick it off for the year and leapt up several places on the top 100 NZ birders on eBird. I'd have been able to hold off the challenge of Bruce that other notorious Otago Twitcher, and had a hope of maintaining my rightful position well up in the top 100 NZ birders. Instead I'm likely to slip out of the top 100 for the second consecutive year.

Sorry what was that? The rare bird? Well yes um well. Nothing to write home about actually. Couldn't give a stuff to be honest.
