Arriving in New Zealand in 1975 from England Ann Sherlock and husband Rob settled in the Waikato where Ann found a job as a secondary school English teacher. Ann's attention to detail, grammar and good writing were to prove just what the Canterbury Region of Birds New Zealand needed in a newsletter editor. But that was in the future.

Ann and Rob had always enjoyed hill-walking in Derbyshire and the Lake District, transferring this love to the high country of both the North and South Islands of New Zealand. In 2000 they decided to retire to Christchurch so Rob could more easily partake in his love of gliding and they could both do lots of walks and tramps. They never did anything by halves, so they did amazingly difficult routes, carrying a tent, across the main divide and up and down the length of Canterbury and Nelson. Seeing native birds along the way and recording the sightings led to Ann's involvement with the Atlas project and she joined OSNZ in 2004 after giving then Canterbury RR Nick Allen data for lots of 10 km squares that no one else had contributed to.

In 2007 Ann was kind enough to agree to be editor for Canterbury OSNZ's newsletter *The Wrybill* and did this in a very efficient and thorough way until 2014, producing lovely issues that many people wrote to say they enjoyed. Extremely fussy about spelling, grammar and getting facts right, Ann would pester me as RR for copy for *The Wrybill*, having to fit the newsletter into a busy schedule including overseas trips to visit her family scattered all over the world. She could be exasperating, but she was a lovely genuine person, very funny and generous and enthusiastic about the natural world, the planet, people and Birds New Zealand. She is very much missed.

Recent Happenings

Our final two field trips of the year took place in November. First up was the annual Ashley River survey. More than twenty volunteers participated including many OSNZ members. The numbers of Wrybill, Banded Dotterel, Pied Stilt and South Island Pied Oystercatcher were much as expected but the numbers of Blackbilled Gulls and Black-fronted Terns were lower than expected. Hopefully this is just normal variation and not part of a long term trend. The second field trip was to Lake Ellesmere for the Summer Wader Count. Only one Wrybill was seen, but good numbers of Pacific Golden Plovers were counted, including 26 at Yarrs Bay. See the attached spreadsheet for full results.

Eight members were treated to a pleasant walk around Styx Mill Reserve for the last ramble of 2015. The main sighting of note was that of a Ring-necked Pheasant. One Shining Cuckoo was heard but despite plenty of looking, none were seen.

The last evening meeting of 2015 began with a well – attended, delicious pot luck dinner. Ron Nilsson then led a discussion about the Black Stilt including the pros and cons of introducing them to the Ashley River area. Ron also gave an interesting insight into the early conservation work which was done with this species.

2016 Birds NZ Conference/AGM

This year's conference will be held in Napier at the Museum Theatre Gallery, Marine Parade, during Queens Birthday Weekend (4-6 June 2016). Two days will be filled with scientific papers and workshops, while on the third day field trips will be made to local places of birding interest. The AGM will be held on Saturday afternoon. A variety of workshops (such as the use of GPS, triangulation methods for locating birds by sound, and a look at historical books at the museum) will be held on Sunday morning, followed up by a trip to the estuary on Monday. These are excellent get togethers, plus a good chance to check out the birds in a different area. The deadline for Earlybird registration (only \$95) is 31 March. Please register online or contact Jan if you don't have a computer.

Banded Birds

Black-billed Gulls with bands such as "M13" have been banded in the north of the South Island this breeding season. Birds carrying white bands were caught at colonies on the Wairau River, yellow bands are from the Clarence River and red from the Buller. Black-fronted Terns have either coloured bands or flags with a twoletter combination such as "AB". Terns with white bands or flags are from either the Wairau River or Wairau Lagoons, whereas yellow banded/flagged birds have been caught on the upper Clarence or Acheron Rivers. Sightings of birds banded as described would be really appreciated. You can either post them on birdingnz.net or send to Claudia Mischler (Claduia@wmil.co.nz) for gulls or Nikki McArthur (Nikki@wmil.co.nz) for terns. For eBirders, it would be useful if you added a comment about any Black-billed Gull or Blackfronted terns in your checklists, specifying whether any were banded or not.
