MORE RECENTLY,

The OSNZ New Zealand Bird Conference held at Palmerston North over Queen's Birthday Weekend had 28 short talks, workshops and field trips and plenty of bird banter in-between. The scientific papers included topics from microbial infection of kiwi eggs, stress in little blue penguins, migration of red knots, to personality of dunnocks, and musings about Chatham Island's extinct duck "Pachyanas".

Our Nelson region was well represented among conference delegates. Half a dozen of us made the trip up by car, plane or train. Thanks go to outgoing council member David Melville and outgoing secretary Pete Gaze for their expertise and many many hours of contribution to the Society, and to Ingrid Hutzler for her continued behind the scenes work as Executive Officer. Alec Milne and Richard Stocker took to the podium to show evidence supporting the continued existence of populations of South Island kokaka and of course yours truly was there to enjoy it all.

At the Regional Representative's meeting, combining with Council for some discussion, three upcoming projects were mooted. A national survey of red billed gulls, a North Island dabchick survey (we just scrape in with this one!) and a national survey of birds utilising sewer ponds. ARE YOU GAME

Waterfowl are sporting wonderful winter plumages and are readily spotted around estuaries and coastal ponds at the moment. Shoveler ducks, grey teal and scaup seem to be more common than anecdotal accounts suggest from 20-30yrs ago. While a close watch is kept, by organisations other than OSNZ, on the build up of black swans for their potential interference with airways, Ken George tells of a lovely sighting of 5 mute swan grazing in a farmer's paddock in Golden Bay. Canada geese have taken a liking for the Waimea Est and continue to breed on Bells Island and in Motueka it's not unusual to spot a Cape Barren goose or two, probably flown the coop from a nearby farm.

Thanks go to Rob Schuckard for organising the **wader counts**, he writes: The OSNZ winter count 2014 went very well with all areas well covered. A total of about 20 000 shorebirds were counted, 2 500 migratory and 17 500 endemic.

of about 20.000 shorebirds were counted, 2.500 migratory and 17.500 endemic shorebirds. Highlights were 3 NZ Dotterels, 50 Wrybills, 1 Grey Plover, 4 Red necked Stints and 1 Sanderling.

Farewell Spit – High number of Pied Oystercatcher, Banded Dotterel and Ruddy Turnstone.

Golden Bay – Very low numbers of Banded Dotterel and Bar-tailed Godwits. These birds were particularly missing from Westhaven and may have been feeding inland in the paddocks.

Tasman Bay – Low number of Pied Oystercatcher likely due to inland feeding but high number of Banded Dotterel and Ruddy Turnstone.
