RECENT EVENTS

We have managed to carry out our usual birding activities in spite of some periods of inclement weather. Beach patrols have yielded below average numbers for the time of year on the west coast with no unusual finds except for two Grey Petrel.

Murray Tapp spoke on the creation and conservation of wetland areas from his viewpoint as a farmer with many years experience. His main points were that the water table in New Zealand has dropped over time, and that pine trees in particular draw large amounts of water from their immediate area. The developers of new subdivisions need to direct water flow away more appropriately than is often done at present. Dams need to be constructed with a down-flow pipe to enable them to be emptied efficiently if necessary. Waterfowl rapidly colonise any suitable environment, and he has observed Shags actively hunting and eating ducklings.

Audrey Williams talked about the workshop she had been to on how to deal with birds caught in oil spills. If this happened in our area, some difficult decisions would have to be made on which species to concentrate the limited resources available locally at present. It takes a surprising amount of resources and time to clean just one bird.

We had discussions on the concerns regarding the proposed Te Arai development plans at Mangawhai and how this will affect the Fairy Tern breeding areas. We also discussed the need to find a new permanent meeting place for monthly meetings. Then everyone enjoyed watching an excellent programme on bird behaviour from 'The Life of Birds' series.

Congratulations are due to Jean Hawken who was awarded a Conservation award for her many years of hard work eliminating weeds and noxious animals from her property at Maunu.

Early August the astonishing news arrived via email that there was a mounted specimen of a Taiko, or Magenta Petrel, which had been in the Canterbury museum since at least 1910, incorrectly identified and labelled as having been obtained in the Pacific Ocean. The museum will advise how it was obtained when the records are searched.

- 1 cattle egret on the 'pig paddock' on Waipu Cove Road (Janet Snell, Prue Cozens)
- 1 white heron seen during Kaipara Harbour count at Simpson Road, Dargaville (Janet Snell)
- 1 sooty shearwater was found on Hatea Drive following the July storm and was taken to the Bird Recovery Centre (Prue Cozens)
- Jean Hawken found 3 dead kereru on her property at Maunu Rd, which had possibly died after feeding on poisonous weeds in the cemetery near-by

SOUTH ISLAND SIGHTINGS

In February four friends stayed in a simple bach that looked out onto the wide bed of the Hopkins River at the top of Lake Ohau, having come over 12 cattle stops, 5 one way bridges and 1 ford. On 21st February we walked a short track through the bush at Temple Stream and on coming out of the beech trees onto a grassy open patch saw a dark long-tailed bird fly across – very close. A Falcon – near enough to clearly see its colour and markings as it roosted in a tree, it remained for about 15 seconds and then off and away into the trees – What a treat!

Our second viewing on 24th February was not at close quarters. We were on the Mt Somers track, a clear sky, and soaring and floating up near the rocky outcrops we saw another. These two sightings and having lunch on the edge of the bush with Riflemen feeding on the tree trunks within a metre were highlights for this group of Northerners. Oh yes – and Hectors Dolphins in Flea Bay, Banks Peninsula, and elusive Brown Creepers in Kakahu Bush, Geraldine
