COMPLEMENTARY GROUP

At our May meeting we were joined by a delegation from the recently formed PUKENUI-WESTERN HILLS FOREST CHARITABLE TRUST who spoke to us of their work to date in the Western Hills area and outlined their hopes for the future. The area has high conservation value, with a number of historic and cultural sites.

Alan Martin, Sheryl Mai, Dennis Hewitt and Margaret Pohe of the Trust explained their backgrounds, and detailed their hopes to restore the habitat after a series of both expensive and extensive vermin and predator eradication programmes. Efforts from then onward would aim at sustaining the flora and resident fauna. A number of our members indicated their willingness to assist with a "five minute" or spot survey to establish a "benchmark" population of birdlife present in the Reserve.

BIRDS AND THE TREES - Not the birds & the bees!

A quick trip to Blenheim on May 16th & 17th 2010 to attend a family funeral saw me staying with cousins Christine and Noel Donelley on their small dry stock unit at Dumgree, just west of Seddon, near the Awatere Valley. As you fly into Blenheim Airport, there are grape vines as far as the eye can see – miles upon miles to the North, South, East and West, with their autumn leaves glowing yellow and highlighting a distinct lack of trees anywhere near the vineyards.

Noel's farm-let is absolutely flat and completely surrounded by grapes. The four boundaries of his property were planted by the previous owners with trees, to act as shelter-belts from the wind. These trees have now become a "thorn in the side" of the neighbouring grape growers whose vines are planted in very neat, orderly rows; well weeded and tended, with a notable absence of any trees or shrubs that might provide a nesting place or shelter for the dreaded menace of the grape – BIRDS!

One owner was telling us that the little Silvereyes were the worst, because they fly from bunch to bunch taking pecks here and there from the grapes, which spoils the bunches. One way in which the growers are attempting to combat this menace, is by luring the New Zealand Falcon into the area by feeding them among the vines. Dead chickens are obtained from local poultry farmers and deep-frozen until needed when they are thawed and portions thrown into the air as the Falcon flies overhead.

At one corner of Noel's land, adjacent to his driveway, there is a small platform on the top of a two metre tall pole where the Falcons are fed. These birds seem to very quickly learn about the chicken meals provided for them and usually arrive one at a time either early in the morning, or late in the day. We had seen a few New Zealand Harriers in the air and asked whether they also fed upon the chickens, but "No" said the grower, "the Falcons are much faster flying than the Harriers and even if they dropped a bird, they can swoop down and retrieve it before the Harrier can get there!" I was sorry to miss this feeding routine, but Noel was the only one up and about at that early hour!

The next morning while having our morning tea, Christine said "Look out the window into the Banksia tree in the garden, there are two Bellbirds hopping about and calling to each other." We walked quietly outside and watched them fly from tree to tree in the garden and Noel said that he thought that they were young birds because their call had not yet developed into the proper Bellbird call. It was a special treat for me to see them really close-up with such a great view of their subtle colours.

Noel then proceeded to tell me that he was, many years ago, a member of the first group to go with David Crockett to the Chatham Islands in the early stages of the "Taiko" Project. Do you remember that David? I think that Noel and Christine are biding their time before selling out to the grape-growers and returning to their Northern roots at Waikaraka and One Tree Point where the BIRDS and the TREES are very precious.

LAKE AND POND SURVEYS 2009/10

JACK BISSET WETLAND - 18th March 2010

CONDITIONS: Bright, hot sunshine and a gentle southerly breeze. Our visit was from 4-00p.m. until 6-00p.m. hoping to see more birdlife during the early evening, but this was not the case. Most noticeable was the reduction in the number of passerines. Two staff of the Contractor Siteworx left just after 4-00p.m. They have a transporter parked down on the river margin and are working with two diggers on the far side of the south-eastern pond.

There has been very little rain since our last visit and the ground is dry and hard with sparse cover. Only the kikuyu grass is green, but the grazing cattle are in good condition. The water level in the main pond is down, possibly by 40 plus centimetres. Birds seen were;


HAWKENS POND
