### **WRAPPING-UP 2010**

The presenters at our November meeting were Carol and Detlef Davies who had recently returned from a trip to Ecuador where they were guests of the owner of a new jungle accommodation lodge who wants their assistance and expertise to prepare pamphlets to promote his lodge to bird-watchers and others by making them aware of the immense variety of birds, butterflies, frogs etc. A major concern for them is the destruction of habitat by both mining and logging operations; leading to projects to provide alternative income for the locals.

Detlefs power-point presentation covered five weeks in Peru and three weeks in Ecuador and gave us a glimpse of Tiger Heron, Pygmy Owl, Humming birds, Rufous Spine-tail and Andean "Cock of the Rock". Many species of frogs there are, as yet, unidentified.

Members also admired and purchased some of the desk-top calendars prepared by Carol using their photographs of local and exotic wildlife.

Our final meeting of the year was an enjoyable pot-luck dinner followed by a DVD compiled by a recent newcomer to our group, Trevor Storr, whose bird photography of a visit to the island of SKOMER (off the south-west coast of Britain) was a pleasant surprise. Trevor's visit to the island was extended when the weather cut up rough and he was not able to leave as planned. Skomer is off the coast of Wales and the rugged cliff faces are home to an interesting range of sea-birds. Your presentation was much appreciated Trevor, especially the bonus clip of the motorcycles!! Nice to see Carol and Detlef join us again

### **RECENT SIGHTINGS**

Out in our garden in Takahe Street, Tikipunga, at 11-00a.m. on Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> December 2010 a lot of twittering was heard in the trees on our southern boundary fence. Standing quite still, we noticed a Grey Warbler feeding a very well grown and podgy Shining Cuckoo chick.

The Shining Cuckoo chick followed the Grey Warbler very closely, begging for food as soon as it saw the host getting close. Then, eight days later on 6<sup>th</sup> January, we again saw the Cuckoo following the Warbler in the same area – an interesting observation.

Late in the afternoon of 3<sup>rd</sup> January we took a drive out to Marsden Point and walked along the N.Z. Refining Co. boundary to a point where the Ponding area is for the internal surface-water cleansing operation. This is where Red Billed Gulls had nested within the NZRC compound following a malfunction of their bird-scaring system. Although it was late in the nesting season, we counted ca.200 birds, half of whom were juveniles, and a few still on nests.

As we walked along the fence-line returning to the car-park, we noted three pairs of N.Z. Dotterel plus two young chicks within the compound. There were a further two single Dotterel hovering on the margins of the territory of the pairs – perhaps they are observing the mating behaviour!!
