At that meeting, Janet and Julie told of having sighted a Royal Spoonbill that was banded at the Wairau Lagoon on 16th Jan 1996, making it some 17 ½ years old.

In August, Anne McCracken and Heather O'Brien entertained us with some very good film clips of the courting behaviour of Dabchicks and of Australasian Little Grebe on the Whangarei Sewage Treatment Wetlands, Kioreroa Road, Whangarei. We also enjoyed seeing some of Anne's pics from her visit to Holland.

In September, Hilton Ward provided a PowerPoint presentation for the seventeen members present, showing the work that he and Melva are doing to provide access to a wetland at Waiotoi Road, Ngunguru. Hilton has a good photographic eye for fauna with some excellent shots of native orchids and other vegetation. Also seen!

A little earlier this year Pauline and Kevin were in Kerikeri and stopped for a coffee and a bite of lunch at a nice cozy little café which had both indoor and verandah seating. As the temperature was rather cool, we chose a table alongside a window, but inside the café. There was another table outside with just a pane of glass between us, and on it were the usual ashtray and a container of three types of sweeteners.

While waiting for our meal we watched a House Sparrow fly onto the table outside and choose a sleeve of raw sugar from the container – tugging at the paper until it came free and allowed him to flutter to the ground with his "spoils". He then proceeded to chew at the ends of the paper until it was moistened and he could shred it. After working on it rather vigorously at each end, he managed, after some 8 - 10 minutes to gain entry to the sugar crystals inside.

When we commented on this to the proprietor as he brought our coffees, he told us that "the blighters only take the light brown coloured paper tubes containing raw sugar, ignoring the black coloured ones full of white sugar and the blue ones containing Sucaryl" Who knew that the common House Sparrow was both smart and intelligent!
