Ornithological Snippets



Spoonbills up - on 1 March there were 77 Royal Spoonbills at Hawksbury Lagoon. On the 11th George Murray saw 52 roosting at Hooper's Inlet and Connie Wright saw about 20 flying from Port Chalmers towards the harbour entrance.

By 21 March there were well over 30 still at Karitane and Merton and at least 20 at

Blueskin Bay. But just in case you're starting to feel that Otago should sell itself as Spoonbill capital of the World (amongst other things) it's worth remembering that there were 300 or so at Lake Ellesmere recently.

Godwits down and out – well – migrating early?

When Peter Langlands saw the flock of **Bar-tailed Godwits** in the Catlins, including 45 marked birds, start to disappear in the first week of March, Phil Battley thought they must have moved elsewhere in Otago and Southland and asked that Otago sites be checked for "his" birds. Mary Thompson checked Aramoana on 15th March and found only 140 birds, all of which were easily checked for bands and none present. This contrasts with 502 on 12 February and 450 on 22nd, of which 6 were banded; 3 from Warrington in 2007, the usual one from Awarua Bay and

one from Victoria. At Blueskin Bay there were 278 on 9 March, down from 813 on 12 February and not a band in sight. Most of the birds remaining at the Catlins migrated around the 15th and by the 18th only a few were left in breeding plumage and only 3 of the 45 adults marked were on the estuary.

848 **Black-billed Gulls** were roosting at Karitane on 24 February. That is about 4.5% of the world population, qualifying Karitane as a wetland of national significance under the Ramsar Convention! About 100 (not quite enough as the cut-off is 1%), along with 150 **Black-backed Gulls** were roosting at Hawksbury Lagoon on 7 March. These birds appeared to come in from far out at sea around 6.30pm. Some plodded across the beach to the lagoon whilst others headed along the coast around Matanaka, possibly to a roost further north.

A Falcon, this year a young one, returned to Waitati as usual about mid-March. Between sitting in the gum trees for hours, it was seen pursuing a Mallard and a Rosella, so is presumably saving the Orokonui Ecosanctuary goodies for later.

Eric de Leeuw saw a **Little Owl** on Highcliff Rd. just past Centre Rd. on 2 March; most likely the same one as seen twice in mid December last year by his parents when they came over from Canada.

On 14 March Bob Cunninghame reported that "Over the last 10 days we have heard **Morepork** calls from Chingford Park and above the old NEV quarry; on our own property (210 Signal Hill Road); and from the vicinity of the Alhambra Ground. Mostly at night – between 9.00 and 11.00 pm and also early morning – 5.30 to 6.00 am. Our neighbours higher up Signal Hill Road have also heard calls on their property. Whether there is one only, or more I cannot say." Hamish Spencer in North East Valley reckoned he heard one far off on 14th. At Waitati several people heard one or maybe two birds calling around the village from mid-February onwards; the first calls heard away from the upper Orokonui Valley since late March last year.

Bob also wondered if there has been a paucity of **Shining Cuckoos** in Dunedin this year. "We have heard very few shining cuckoos this last spring and summer. Twice only on our property – once before Christmas and once in mid-January, and I heard one in the Gardens/Opoho Road area in late January."

Peter Langlands found a **Bittern** on the morning of 18 March at the mouth of the Catlins River (into the "lake"). He also saw one on the roadside nearby about six weeks before and reports lots of fernbirds in the wetland but says that sadly some drainage/clearance work is taking place on the wetland at present.

Several **Arctic Skuas** were seen off Karitane, Warrington and Shag Point in late February and March.

Further evidence of a population of **Pheasants** around Waikouaiti came with a dead female on the side of the road at Cherry Farm on 7 March.

Otago Summer Wader Count No2 12 February 2013


This late summer wader count was very successful. Good visibility, light wind and a good number of birds. Unfortunately Hooper's Inlet was still blocked. The Harbour had far more birds than in November last year. Last November there were 127 Pied Oystercatchers counted in the Harbour and 936 this time, with most on the rooves of the sheds at Port Chalmers. The absence of Godwits at both Papanui and Hooper's was offset by a good number of 502 at Aramoana. The Banded Dotterels were missing there on the day, but 280 were reported on 1 February.

It is nice to be able to complete a wader count in the sun without the ghastly Southerly wind. Let's hope we have the same during the coming winter wader count on 9 June.
