


Fri 5 May Greg Blunden spoke at our indoor meeting tonight, his subject being the recent progress with predator control with particular reference to our local Kiwi population and the ambitious future plans through the Kiwi Foundation.

1 – 5 June ANNUAL CONFERENCE & AGM

Detlef, Russell, Gay & Pauline attended this event in Wellington. The Regional Reps meeting took place on the Thursday followed by 2 days of scientific presentations. These were all of a very high standard & excellently illustrated. Unfortunately the sunshine which subsisted throughout the indoor events gave way to rain for the planned field trips so boats to Kapiti Island & Mana Island did not run. Some of us managed to get to Somes Island in Wellington Harbour & saw some Redcrowned Parakeets in the rain and 3 of the Far North contingent took a break from one afternoon's lectures to go to Karori Wildlife Park.

To mention just a few things discussed, it is proposed to put the regions' newsletters on the Society's website so Far North will hopefully be featured there soon. The Brand Name discussion continues & a further referendum seems to be necessary in the near future.



Fri 9 June FAR NORTH AGM

This took place at Detlef & Carol's house at 180 Landing Road, Kerikeri and the minutes were taken by Isabella, as follows:

Meeting commenced at 7.40 p.m.

Present: Detlef Davies R.R, Isabella Godbert – treasurer, Carol Davies, Ian Wilson, Anthea Goodwin, Kerry and Jane Walshe, Russell Thomas, Derry Godbert.

Apologies: Bill Campbell, Chris and Marianne Sale, Gay Blunden, Pauline Stephinson, Lynette and Bill Smith, Mike Bryan, Paul and Edith Asquith, Laureen Alston.

Minutes – the minutes of last years AGM were taken as read (having been set out in the Aug 05 newsletter).

Matters arising – No results had been received of the dotterel recounts – to be investigated.

R.R. report – Detlef read out his report, he listed events as they had happened – received with thanks.

Treasurer's report -- Isabella presented the financial report. She moved that it be accepted, Russell seconded, all approved.

Election of officers -

Detlef is happy to stay as R.R., Isabella is happy to stay as Treasurer and Laureen, although not able to be present, had indicated that she is happy to stay as Regional Recorder.

Russell moved that the existing officers should stay, this was approved.

Carol volunteered to be secretary – Detlef moved that this should be accepted as a new position, Isabella seconded and all agreed.

Bird recording in the Far North and proposed **site guide** – Detlef reported that at the conferences RRs were asked to help produce a site guide for their area. He listed suitable sites to be investigated.

Report from 2006 conference _ 4 members went to the conference, Detlef, Russell, Gay and Pauline. It was a very interesting conference though bad weather meant there were no field trips.

Far North programme – Detlef asked for ideas, Anthea suggested Awanui harbour. Detlef suggested contacting Chris Sale.

Boat – Detlef said we had hoped to get a boat for wader surveys but the offer for this seems to have been retracted & no longer seemed likely. Kaitaia DOC have been very helpful in providing boats so far.

Russell reported that a group of people were coming up from Auckland to capture and ring waders by mistnetting in mid September and would need lots of help. Detlef will inform people when he knows more.

Other business - Isabella produced a beach patrol report.

A discussion was held about contribution to petrol costs. Agreed where applicable but Far North funds are insufficient & we would need to look to central funds for some contribution.

Leaflets – Detlef showed the new leaflets which will be put in the library.

A general thanks and appreciation was given for Detlef's newsletters.

Detlef and Carol asked for contributions for the newsletters.

A discussion was held about the format of the evening meetings.

The meeting closed at 9.05 p.m.

Following the AGM, Russell Thomas showed us some slides of the Chatham Islands, where he has been many times. For islands which are not a great distance from the New Zealand mainland, they hold a surprising number of endemic birds.

16 – 17 July Winter Wader Count

As so often happens, winter weather delayed our wader count in June but boats to wader roosts were able to run this weekend and the totals of the various species are shown on pages 4 & 5.

RECENT REPORTS

We have little to report this time other than birds seen during the wader counts. Kevin Maxwell reports a **Nankeen Kestrel** near Kaitaia airfield in July and again in late August; it has probably been resident in the area for some time. We also hear of 2 **Kakas** seen regularly in the vicinity of Peacock Gardens, Kerikeri.

BEACH PATROLS

John Dawn (message dated 18 July)

Our 2 last beach patrols have taken place during very high tides when the beach was being swept clean right up to the dunes. It seems likely that we have missed birds either washed out to sea or buried. Some of the dates for the rest of the year have been changed again to times when the tides are later or earlier, in the hope that birds washed ashore will still be there.

90 Mile Beach dates (& high tide times): 2 Sept (4.00), 7 Oct (8.00), 4 Nov (8.45) & 2 Dec (7.15). **Karikari dates** (& high tide times): 21 Oct (7.45), 18 Nov (6.30) & 16 Dec (4.45).

ROBINS ARE RETURNING TO NORTHLAND

As part of my 2006 Royal Society Teacher Fellowship, hosted by Greg and Gay Blunden of the NZ Kiwi Foundation, we have just completed our DOC application to transfer 50 robins to the Russell Peninsula in autumn next year. With the support of Russell Landcare Group and as part of the Pest-Free North of Auckland initiative, this will be the first of a series of native bird translocations planned for Northland over the next decade.

Why robins you might ask? North Island robin are considered ideal for translocation as they are not currently endangered and are easy to monitor and transport. They are a relatively easy bird for a first transfer and are a people-friendly species which is great for advocacy.

After research, we decided the source of robins was to be the Mangatutu Block in the Waikato as there is an abundance of accessible birds. The birds will be released onto private land on the Russell Peninsula which contains 3,000 hectares of integrated pest management.

Perhaps the most important requirement in the whole process is to monitor the release area for predators and establish the best eradication scheme. The rat numbers at Russell are less than 5% and a series of baited ground tunnels has been set up to maintain these low levels, particularly with the monitoring presence of Norway rats.

Another requirement is monitoring of the banded birds once they are released. No one knows for sure where they will head to but our goals are :

To successfully capture, translocate and release up to 50 toutouwai with an approx 50:50 sex ratio adults/juveniles, from the Maungatutu block, Rangitoto Range to the Russell Peninsula.

For this translocation to have a less than 10% mortality rate covering transportation and the first winter season.

To have birds breeding in the release catchment within the first year.

To monitor for successful breeding by the sighting of unbanded birds and for dispersal within the release areas or beyond.

To have 50% of transferred birds remaining in the release area.

To establish a viable self-sustaining breeding population by 2017.

We still have some way to go in terms of finding a suitable vet to do the disease screening, finalising iwi consent, informing bordering neighbours, learning about banding, and most importantly, having our application accepted by DOC. We welcome any help and advice and intend having a public awareness meeting in Russell within the next two months. Watch this space and we will keep you up to date as things progress.

Advance Notice


