

RECENT EVENTS

Sat – Thurs 23 – 28 Sept WADER MIST- NETTING

This was a visit to the Far North by OSNZ members, David Melville, Rob Schuckard, Phil Battley and Willie Cook who are involved in research into migration routes of Arctic waders which visit New Zealand in the northern winter so are seen here in the greatest numbers in the southern summer. As those who were present at our last meeting will have seen from Laureen and Carol's presentation, it was a very interesting week.

There were 15 of us on the Sunday but this reduced to 7 on Monday, a few of us were able to stay all week. We met at North Wind backpackers near Henderson Beach with a view to setting up nets on Kowhai Beach where a tight flock of over 200 Godwits were present. The whole project was very much at the experimental stage as no mist-netting had been done in the Far North before. We had no idea which route the waders took when they flew in from Houhora Harbour & nothing was caught that night. It was decided to move operations to Parengarenga Harbour where a boat & some locals helped us find our way around & get an idea of birds' movements. Nets had to be put up in the evening so as not to be visible and target birds were the ones flying to their night time roosts. Eventually on the last day, with nets erected on Ahiaruhe Shellbank, 3 Godwits and 1 Knot were caught for banding. We were very pleased with the support and enthusiasm from the local people who will no doubt be pleased to hear that we will be back soon.

lan Wilson, Detlef and Carol did the trek up to the DOC hut in the pest controlled part of the forest, staying overnight between the 4 hour walk each way. Early on Tuesday morning we listened for the Kokako but heard nothing; if it was still there, it wasn't singing perhaps because of a moderate breeze. We heard and saw lots of Tomtits & a few Pigeons and a Shining Cuckoo sang during one of our 5 minute bird counts.

Sunday 3 Dec BARBECUE AND VIDEO SHOW

We opened this event to Forest & Bird & to the Kiwi Foundation but nearly all of the 15 of us present were OSNZ members. We hope that some future events will attract a wider audience. However, we enjoyed a social evening with Laureen & Carol's presentation on the wader mistnetting week & some spectacular filming by David Attenborough on his famous wildlife films.

RECENT REPORTS and SIGHTINGS

This covers the Far North region since August, compiled by Laureen with additions from Detlef.

North Island Brown Kiwi One found on Heritage bypass work site south of Kerikeri River on 23 Nov & relocated. Successful breeding at Aroha Island & on Purerua.

Australian Little Grebe One on the small lake in Stanners Road, Kerikeri on 10 Dec. **Northern Giant Petrel** 8 juvs astern of the San Columbia 3nm S of Cape Brett on 19 Oct.

Cape Pigeon (Pintado Petrel) Several at same site south of Cape Brett on 19 Oct.

Blue Penguin 1 in Opito Bay on 7 September.

Australasian Bittern One at Mountains Estate on Purerua on 2 Sept, one standing unconcerned by roadside near Karikari turning from SH10 on 15 Oct.

Royal Spoonbill 174 on mudflats at Te Hapua on 25 Sept.

Black Swan 5 flying east to west over Waipapa Basin on 22 Nov

Brown Teal One pair on pond on north end of Urupukapuka Island on 27 Oct.

Nankeen Kestrel The one seen a few months ago around Kaitaia Airport still shows occasionally.

Brown Falcon Kevin Matthews has reported another falcon in Kaitaia looking like this species, a potential first for New Zealand.

Bobwhite Quail 2 or 3 at Kauri Cliffs on 19 Oct (where have they come from?).

Weka One was reported in the Te Ngaere Bay area in May & June (John & Christine McBain)

Spotless Crake Many (7 or more) calling at Mountains Estate on Purerua on 2 Sept.

Variable Oystercatcher Pair nesting at Taemaro Bay.

Black / Smudgy Stilt One with Pied Stilts at Dick Urlich Road, Tokerau Beach.

Pacific Golden Plover One feeding on Hauai Bay, BOI on 4 Nov.

New Zealand Dotterel

Pair with 2 egg nest & 1 chick at Urupukapuka Bay on 27 Oct.

Pair on Parenui Beach north of Orokawa on 28 Oct

Pair at Waipao Bay, Moturua on 31 Oct

8 birds & a chick on Onewhero Beach early Nov, 14 birds there in late Nov.

Pair with 3 half grown chicks & a bird sitting at Taemaro Bay on 22 Nov.

Bar-tailed Godwit Apart from usual counting sites, 26 at Aroha Island from 4 Nov.

Wandering Tattler One at Parengarenga Harbour on 24 Sept.

Sharp-tailed Sandpiper 4 at Paua on 24 Sept.

(Other wader records in count charts)

Kaka One in Russell on 16 Sept. The 2 seen earlier in the Stone Store Hill, Kerikeri were not seen after early November.

Shining Cuckoo Heard in Russell 22 Sept & Waitiki Landing 25 – 27 Sept; heard & seen Landing Road, Kerikeri on 13 Oct & at Ruapekapeka Pa on 12 Nov. Many more heard; it has been a very good season for this species.

Long-tailed Cuckoo One heard in Kerikeri on 4 Sept.

Fernbird Seen Mountains Estate 2 Sept & between Kawakawa & Opua on several dates.

Tomtit One between Russell & Tapeka, male on track between Otupoho & waterfall, Moturua on 31 Oct. Many heard & at least 10 seen in Puketi Forest 13 – 14 Nov.

New Zealand Robin 2 heard, one each side of waterfall, Moturua, 31 Oct.

PROGRAMME

Fri 19 – Fri 26 Jan WADER MIST- NETTING - PART 2

After the experimental but ultimately successful wader netting in September, the team from Nelson (& Auckland) will be back at Parengarenga Harbour to try to catch & band more waders. Helpers will be most welcome for all or any part of the period, let me know if you are coming so that transport sharing can be arranged but please arrange your own accommodation. The organizers will be staying at Waitiki Landing. Over the same period it is hoped to do wader counting and band-spotting both at Parengarenga and at Walker Island & Kowhai Beach.

Fri 16 Feb INDOOR MEETING

Adrian Riegen, the co-ordinator of the wader counts will hopefully be available to come & give a presentation on wader identification & migration. In the course of his studies, Adrian has been to

Alaska where many Arctic waders breed, & to China, an important migration resting place for thousands of birds.

Weekend 3 – 4 March WARAWARA FOREST

We hope at long last to get to this exciting remnant forest to look for Riflemen. Much interest was generated when we first tried to organize the trip so let me know in good time if you would like to come. If we stay overnight we propose to use Campbell Homestay in Broadwood.



The Kagu is from New Caledonia & still survives but the Ou is another Hawaiian bird in a different family from the Oo.

The pictures showed a Little Bittern photographed at Lake Kinkony in Madagascar and a Greater Rhea taken near Jujuy in Argentina.

ARGENTINA in AUGUST 2006

We spent a week in Argentina this year where Seriema Nature Tours took us on a tour through the Andes of the north-west of the country. Our Guide, Hector Slongo, picked us up at Tucuman Airport and in a couple of hours we were high in the cloud forest looking at special birds like the Torrent Duck and Rufous-throated Dipper.

We stayed 2 nights at a lovely lodge in Tafi del Valle, then travelled on northwards towards Cafayate, Salta & Jujuy, eventually to within 60 kms of the Bolivian border at Abra Pampa. Accommodation became progressively more basic but birding momentum was maintained. Among the more exciting species were Andean Condor, Andean & Ornate Tinamous, hummingbirds such as the Red-tailed Comet and Blue-capped Pufflea. magnificent Cream-backed Woodpecker and a whole range of furnarids or ovenbirds including several species of Cinclodes, Canasteros, Earthcreepers, Spinetails, Miners & Thornbirds. These are what cause Argentina to be regarded sometimes as the 'land of the little brown birds' but we found them fascinating.



On the last day we were by the high
Andean lakes at over 4,000 metres, here
we found 3 species of Flamingos - Chilean, Andean
& Puna; also Andean Avocet, Mountain Caracara
and a selection of high altitude finches.



The trip ended at Jujuy from where we boarded a plane back to Buenos Aires. As well as 194 bird species, we enjoyed the Andean mammals such as Guanacos, Vicunas and the strange Mountain Vizcacha. A very exciting experience throughout, despite not escaping the southern winter.
