Film Premiere

Ornithological Snippets

A White Heron was seen again in the Botanic Gardens on 28 July. Tim reports "Today at 1:20pm a White Heron landed and perched in the large gum trees at the bird aviary at the upper Dunedin Botanic Garden. The bird wasn't active (ie. no preening), just looking at the view. The bird was gone by 1:30pm. Interestingly, the local wildlife were not perturbed by the large bird's presence (i.e. no alarm calls), as opposed to their behaviour when a falcon perches in the same tree."

One of the two breeding plumaged **Bar-tailed Godwits** at Warrington (with 17 immatures) on August 1 was banded there in February 2006 as an adult male. It has subsequently been seen at Warrington several times over the last two summers. Unfortunately it was limping and although it was hard to tell if the cause was the bands, its condition may well have been the reason why it didn't return to Alaska this year.

Derek Onley saw an immature **NZ Falcon** in Waitati on 29 July and Elton Smith subsequently saw what was probably the same bird cruise across the Orokonui Eco-sanctuary on 6 August.

A **Far-Eastern Curlew** was found at Karitane on 20 July and was still there on the 6 August. This is the first record for Otago in 13 years and the only one since 1966 to be seen in winter.



For all those sceptics who thought it was only a Magpie.....



here is a photo of the Magpie Lark seen at South Westland on 29th April 2008 after a big westerly storm. It was identified by the Stewart-Long family, living at the mouth of Gorge River, two days' walk from a road end. Magpie larks are common throughout Australia but rarely make it as far as Tasmania so maybe there were some grounds for scepticism.

The George Chance Census of Great Crested Grebes in Central Otago, February 2009

This census has been set for the weekend of 21 and 22 February 2009. February was suggested back in November last year by George, in a discussion with Dawn Palmer, since February is the best time to get a post breeding count. It was his experience that the highest numbers were counted then, later than that they seemed to move out of breeding areas.

This census is a follow up from the one carried out in January 2004 to see what differences were come across. The total for Central Otago in 2004 was 97 adults and 27 juveniles. Anecdotal reports indicate that there was a dramatic increase this last breeding season. Lake Hayes in 2004 had a maximum of 57 adults and 18 juveniles. On 17 March 2008 Dawn Palmer counted at Lake Hayes 104 adults and 40 juveniles. Lake Dunstan had in 2004 11 adults and 16 juveniles. The number in November 2007 was 35.

Numbers at Lakes Wanaka and Hawea was high, but that was in winter 2007. In January 2004 Wanaka had 4, including 2 juveniles and Wanaka had none. Next year we will be able to find out if there are breeding populations on these lakes.

The census involves checking all lakes. The large ones will be tackled by motorized boats, but we may need additional kayaks, and the smaller ones by car/foot.

For logistic purposes, organizing transport, accommodation, the latter two most likely subsidized, we would like to have names of participants interested in this exciting project as soon as possible.

Long Point, Catlins.

We have been asked by the Yellow-eyed Penguin Trust to survey the birds of their new reserve in the Catlins, near Long Point, south-east of Owaka. See the April newsletter for an account of the preliminary visit. The survey will involve walking around the reserve counting landbirds, checking the cliffs for nesting seabirds – visually from land unless some more intrepid members would like to take to the water – and maybe staying out after dark to listen for shearwaters and the like. Everything in fact except Yellow-eyed Penguins. Ideally it would be interesting to get out to 4

Cosgrove Island as well. How much we do and whether we go down for one day or the weekend depends on how keen you all are. The date: 8 and/or 9 November. If you are interested please contact Derek Onley or Peter Schweigman as soon as possible.


