At the June meeting, Colin Scadden, Miles King, Brian Boeson and Barbara Lovatt (Narena Olliver was unable to be present at the meeting) spoke of their impressions and highlights. The varied papers at the Scientific Day, and, of course, the opportunity to meet old friends, make new friends and to generally enjoy the company of fellow-birders.

OSNZ MERITORIOUS AWARDS 2008

The nominator was Miles King and the seconder was Tenick Dennison.

On behalf of the Wairarapa OSNZ members, I would like to nominate Brian Boeson for the Meritorious Service Award.

Brian, with his interest in birds spanning 50 years, has been instrumental in our continued strong membership. Joining the OSNZ in Wellington in 1957, he moved to the Wairarapa in 1962.

Being first drawn to an interest in birds while walking on Waikanae beaches where he was perplexed by the number of dead seabirds. This led to contact with the late Peter Bull, who Brian describes as his mentor, which began a "life long" fascination with birds, especially seabirds.

Beach patrols led onto record keeping. He assisted Peter Bull with the records which had lapsed during WW2, updating and recording from 1939 through to 1961 when Brian took over the job solely for two years.

Frequently beach patrolling was made more interesting by returning with rare and unusual specimens in the boot of his car. Unfortunately, at that time he owned a Volkswagen with the boot in the front, which made for very aromatic trips. This brings a whole new meaning to the expression "suffering for ones sport".

Brian was a member of the Mt Bruce National Wildlife Trust Board for 11 years. He has introduced many people to bird watching through numerous talks and was Regional Rep in the 1960's. He also helped create the local field guide, "Where to Find Birds in The Wairarapa"

10 Grey Teal were seen at Henley Lake along with Tui and Bellbird, Kingfishers were seen in Greytown while I Dunnock was reported by Jenny Doring plus a pair of Chaffinch. Barbara's lone Greenfinch was topped by the 50/60, along with a Rosella.seen by Emile at Eketahuna. Miles wasn't left out, seeing both Tui and Bellbird as well as 3 Rook.Jack had been to Wrigley's lagoon where he saw 12 Caspian Tern, 6 Banded Dotterel, 6 Spur Winged Plov er, 6 Grey Teal & 4 Oystercatchers(possible VOC). The previous month Jack had seen 18Dabchhick at the mouth of the Pigeon Bush Stream and 22 Scaup at Barton's lagoon.

REPORT ON THE JUNE FIELD TRIP

As the OSNZ contribution to June Greentown celebration, eleven people visited the MEMORIAL RESERVE in Kuratawhiti St, and the TATE RESERVE, on Papawai Rd. Greytown. BUSH BIRDS observed or heard were

MEMORIAL RESERVE. 2 Fantails, 4 Tui, 12 Grey warblers, and random Silvereyes, Sparrows & Chaffinch

TATE RESERVE A BLACK Fantail, Grey Warblers, Silvereyes, Harrier & Magpies.

As well as the Bush Bird obs. there was some serious botanising, especially in the Memorial Reserve. Jenny Doring pointed out a rare mistletoe which Emile Schmieg confirmed as being......

Cortalsella Salicornioides (See pic below) The host branch, on right is Lophomyrtus Obcordata. The mistletoe is in the left foreground.



Another mistletoe, Lleostylus Micranthus, was found in great profusion on host Totaras. It had droops of sticky yellow fruit. These were originally disseminated by PIOPIO, the extinct native Thrush, but this is now done by Bellbirds and Blackbirds.
