Otago Birds NZ Response to Covid-19

I have decided to **cancel the March Indoor Meeting** in the light of the government's recommendations to minimize unnecessary social contacts. It is disappointing as we had some interesting topics and speakers lined up. However, I believe it is the prudent thing to do and for the benefit of the wider community. In a small community such as Dunedin it is quite easy to inadvertently come into contact with someone who has recently returned from overseas or their family members or friends.

At this stage, I think the Atlas Field trips can continue to be held as we wont be close in confined spaces. However, if you feel you are at risk, may have had contact with someone with Covid-19, or are unwell, please do not go on the field trips.

We do not know yet whether the Wild Dunedin Festival events will be cancelled; at this stage we still plan to hold the Tomahawk Birdwatching event on 18th April; if you can help please contact Andrew or me.

We will keep you informed via the next newsletter of other decisions regarding upcoming events.

Ornithological Snippets

The most exciting report of the period was a probable **Fan-tailed Cuckoo**, seen by Jane Forsyth on the Upper Bridle Track at Haast Pass on 20th February. There has been a veritable spate of **Marsh Crake** sightings recently, with five sightings by three different observers at Lake Hayes between mid-February and early March, while another was photographed at Tautuku Estuary boardwalk on 5th March. The latter is the first record I am aware of from the Catlins – unless anyone else knows differently.

The **Otago Shag** colony in Oamaru numbered around 2000 birds on 1st March, and a similar number of **Spotted Shags** were observed at Nugget Point on 6th March; rather more unexpected was a single bird of the latter species at Lake Hayes on 21st February, seen by Peter Reese. Maree Johnstone reports that twice this month she has seen a pair of **Pied Shags** in Shag Inlet, Burke's, Otago Harbour.

Finally, after travelling to Sutton Salt Lake on 1st March for excellent views of **NZ Pipits** (among other things), the compiler saw another one by the airfield in Balclutha the following morning; later in the week Suzanne Schofeild saw three at the same location.

It's naturally US oriented, though it covers some interesting topics about using the platform. It also deals with the app quite frequently (a lot of which is over my head!) Of course, if you have specific queries about the Atlas scheme, you can contact the eBird team via the bird atlas site, or else you can get in touch with me, and I'll do my best to help.

The sharp-eyed among you may have noticed that the Atlas grid lines on the submission map now show for subsequent checklists, rather than just the initial one of a session. (You may even have noticed that they weren't there previously!)

All being well, we will have another Atlassing trip on **Saturday** 4th April, returning to the Taieri Mouth area. Please phone me (03 418 4415) if you're interested in coming.

The annual meeting of Birds NZ is being held in Christchurch at the Commodore Hotel at Queen's Birthday Weekend. This is a great chance to get to a conference, as it is close. There will be two days of presentations on recent research and a variety of field trips, including atlas trips, bird banding, and a behind-the-scenes tour of the bird collection at the Canterbury Museum.



ADVISORY LETTER:

2020 NZ BIRD CONFERENCE - COVID-19 VIRUS PANDEMIC

Council is circulating this letter to all members of the Society and to presenters to provide advice in the event of possible postponement of the 2020 NZ Bird Conference in Christchurch because of the Covid-19 virus pandemic, and at the same time we wish to provide advice for refunding registration fees.

1. Refunds

If you are unable or do not wish to attend the conference, a full refund will be made for cancellations of individual registrations advised up to 1 May 2020. From 1 May 2020, no refunds will be made. In the event of cancellation and consequent re- selection of field trips, refund of the price difference will be made after the conference.

Council is continually monitoring advice from the Ministry of Health concerning the Covid-19 virus pandemic and will act in accordance with this. As at 13 March 2020, the Ministry of Health does not recommend altering arrangements for public events. However, the situation and the Ministry's response to it is changing all the time.

If a situation occurs where an official government recommendation is made to postpone, or cancel, public gatherings, the Society will postpone the Canterbury conference to a later date and will make full refunds of all registration fees that have been paid for the conference and field trips.

2. Disclaimer

In the event of other unforeseen circumstances (industrial or otherwise) that disrupt the conference, the organisers accept no responsibility. The information on the conference website and in the printed material is correct at the time of publication. However, the conference organisers reserve the right to change information if required and to adjust the conference programme accordingly.

In consultation with Regional Representatives, Council will consider when a future conference will be held in Christchurch if the NZ Bird Conference is not held this year because of the Covid-19 virus pandemic. At this stage no decision has been made on this point.

Bird Atlassing March 1, 2020

Five birders: Mary Thompson, Rowena East, Ivan Lin, Wen Qing Ng and yours truly met at Bunnings' carpark at 9 am then drove to Outram to meet Richard. As we had three cars between 6 of us we split into pairs and continued on SH87.



We did counts on side roads off SH87, Mt Gowrie, Rocklands, and Young before meeting at the Sutton Salt Lake turnoff at 12.30pm. The predominant bird counted was the redpoll, large groups flying from the tussock grasses as we approached. As expected other finches and magpies were well represented.

Before reaching the salt lake we had lunch as we sat on some very comfortable flat rocks. It was sunny, warm and windless and somehow two white-faced herons looked quite out of place in these surrounds.



As we walked around the loop track, every so often we we'd see a pipit, (six in all) each commanding its own patch of rocks. These birds looked as though they belonged here.

Before heading homeward a few more counts were done around the Sutton area, mainly Harcus Road.

A most enjoyable day was had by all. Certainly by me anyway.


