Ornithological Snippets

Lala Frazer reported that a **Great Crested Grebe** (re)appeared at Broad Bay at the end of May, after up to 3 were seen there last winter. Fergus Sutherland and Diana Noonan have both observed a **Royal Spoonbill** overwintering on the Papatowai estuary; a further 3 were roosting by the Owaka Yacht Club during the wader count on 5th July. An intermediate bronze/ pied phase **Stewart Island** (**Otago) Shag** was seen at the Sumpter Wharf colony in Oamaru in early July, with another being seen by Oscar Thomas at Taiaroa Head in June.

Lala Frazer has also noticed that the **Silvereyes** return en masse to here garden during the same week each year, for the last 4 years. Jon Bailey reports seeing a **Tomtit** by the path leading down the pyramids at Okia on 14th June. It was perched on a fence post then flew into bushes on the heathland side of the track, about 50 metres from the pyramids.





Lei Zhu saw and photographed a leucistic **House Sparrow** in Chingford Park on 2nd July; this was also reported in the ODT a few days earlier <u>https://www.odt.co.nz/news/dunedin/rare-bird-left-out-cold</u>

Also in the ODT, coverage of roosting Fantails in Mosgiel; up to 31 were photographed huddled together in a shed. <u>https://www.odt.co.nz/news/dunedin/proverb-loving-fantails-take-flocking-together-seriously</u>

eBird News

Anyone who has used My eBird recently will have noticed that it has been significantly upgraded. Not only is it easier on the eye, and hopefully easier to use, but it also has more features than before. All recent checklists and media uploads are displayed on the home page, along with comparative statistics for recent years, and all management options for your data in one place.

The new My eBird design gives you more ways to explore your eBird observations. The default region displayed will match the region you selected for your eBird Profile. Tap "Change region" at the top to summarize your eBird submissions for any region from a single county to the entire world. Any blue text or number on the page is clickable and will open new ways to filter, sort, and explore your observations.

Silver eyes return dates

The silver eyes generally stay in the bush most of the year but return to the feeders in our gardens in time for the Garden Birds Survey. While 1 or 2 may return occasionally in the 3 weeks prior I was very surprised to see from my bird diary that for the last 4 years they have returned en masse **during the same week**.

These are the return dates in my garden of more than 5 returnees (quickly rising up to 16-36 in the following days) counted at one time. Coincidence?

(Note I know from the year that they had lesions on their beaks or round their eyes which meant I could identify individual birds, that different groups come at different times of the day [observed at breakfast, lunch and early evening] instead of them being the same groups returning as I had previously presumed, so a group of 16 may mean actually more than 48.) 26 May 2017 23 May 2018 22 May 2019 24 May 2020

I did not note the weather at the time but would find it surprising that the weather was the same in that week each year, so I wonder what food source maybe ceases at about that time.

I shall begin noting when they leave and see if the same pattern exists there.
