## **Ornithological Snippets**

Sue Odlin reported a **Mallard** duck with 14 very young ducklings on Lake Waihola on 25 September. The first **Shining Cuckoos** were on the 24 September at Waitati, and on the 28 in Dunedin. Sue Odlin heard them on several mornings from 29 onwards in NE Valley. **Long-tailed Cuckoos** put in an early appearance this year, with the first at Papatowai on 6 October, another record there on 9 Oct, on which date there was also one at Waitati 9 Oct; another was reported from Lake Hayes on 18 Oct.

A **Marsh Crake** was seen again at Lake Hayes on 18 October, and 9 **Wrybill** were at Warrington on 5 October, with 2 staying until at least 9 Oct. Finally, a **White Heron** was seen at Tautuku on 2 October.

## eBird News

#### **Global Big Day**

With other events taking place this weekend, no coordinated effort was made to get a big count in Otago on 9 October. However, 18 observers took part on the day, recording a total of 60 species from 72 unique checklists. Among the highlights, Morepork was recorded in 5 different squares (good to see we're getting into the nocturnal surveys!), while there were early Long-tailed Cuckoos at Waitati and Papatowai, and Wrybill & Red Knot on Warrington Spit. By comparison, NZ as a whole had 137 species from 97 observers, while worldwide there were 7288 species recorded.


## Bird Quiz Night, Wednesday 24 November

## **Report of Counting Birds in the Town Belt**

Sunday, 10 October was a stunning day in between two stormy days so the 25-30 folk who turned up at 9am to learn 5 minute bird counts and enjoy spotting birds in the Town Belt had a splendid time.

Bruce introduced our project and how to do a 5 minute bird count and we split into groups around the Moana Pool Carpark to do a test 5 minute bird count and report back. About 10 folk went with Mary, Petrina and Katie to Prospect Park and walked back along Queens Drive and did 5MBC at 4 count stations and practised spotting birds and identifying calls while walking between stations. We were lucky to record a brown creeper calling, and along the walk came across a small flock of at least 3 brown creeper accompanied by silvereyes and grey warblers. This was a special treat. We also saw several kereru close-up and a black fantail.

Bruce and Georgina took their group to count stations near Moana Pool and generated a good deal of interest in the project.



## **Warrington Beach Surprises**

Bar-tailed godwits were returning to Blueskin Bay and Hoopers around 15 September

Nick has been walking the beach in the inclement weather during October and came across 9 wrybill very actively feeding among the seaweed at the high water mark on Tuesday 5 October during the easterly storm.

Georgina and Petrina went with Nick on Wednesday and they were still there.





By Thursday when Nick took Mary, Adrienne and Paul only 2 wrybill were found, but 785 bartailed godwits with nine actively feeding juveniles. These young birds, who have flown directly from Alaska, have very crisp, strikingly marked wing feathers and looked quite different from the 'tatty' adults.

On Saturday 9 October Nick reported 2 knots, one still with some breeding plumage, had turned up.







## Moeraki Pelagic Saturday 16 October

Another successful Moeraki Pelagic on Saturday with Ezifish Charters, with Sunday's unfortunately cancelled due to winds picking up. Had a solid mix of birds including stunning views of Broad-billed Prion, Black-bellied Storm-Petrel and Grey-backed Storm Petrel sticking close to the boat. Oddities were 3 Shovelers and a Yellowhammer quite far from shore heading back toward land.



The marine mammals were showing off too with a pair of big male Orca and 4 Shepherd's Beaked Whales very close to us. Next trip is scheduled for **Tuesday 28th December**, please email me at <a href="mailto:oscarkokako@gmail.com">oscarkokako@gmail.com</a> if you are interested in joining.
