Ornithological Snippets

27 Indian Peafowl were seen on 16 July near Omakau.

SI Pied Oystercatchers continue their spread to the breeding grounds, with several observers commenting from around the region on their early arrival. In a similar vein a single **Black-billed Gull** was at Falls Dam on 10 July. A **Black-backed Gull** with a deformed (hooked) bill was reported from Tomahawk Lagoon on 9 July. An **Antarctic Fulmar** was seen off Taiaroa Head on 2 July, with another offshore on 15 July.

Finally there have been good numbers of **Blackbirds** around, with the peak count being 103 near Raes Junction on 7 July.



eBird News

We are about to enter the final month of winter fieldwork for the Atlas. Most of the remaining gaps are in the north and west, but there is still scope for making a telling contribution closer to Dunedin. DV29 (Shannon), DV31 (Ross Stream) and DW28 (Clarks Stream) have all had minimal coverage; and DZ31 (S of Brighton) is mainly sea, but must have more than 11 species present.

To round off winter coverage, there will be a field trip on **Saturday 5 August**, probably to the Morrisons area. Please contact me to confirm interest.

Outside Orokonui: Robin Monitoring

Birds NZ members have been monitoring robins|kakaruai on land adjacent to Orokonui Ecosanctuary since 2017, to assess whether a self-sustaining population is successfully establishing outside the predator fence. We try to map all robin territories, band robins, and monitor the breeding success of as many pairs as possible.

We meet every second Saturday morning between mid-August and December, and there are usually carpooling options from Dunedin. No previous experience is needed and, although the ability to walk off track is useful, it is not essential. Banded tui and bellbird

Please check tui and bellbird at your feeders for coloured bands.

Mary spotted a tui with bands on 5 July at 12.15pm with combination left: pale blue/metal; right: white/yellow.

Murray Efford reports that he banded this bird as adult in April 2013, seen in Ethel St and Balmacewen Rd in 2014 & 2015 & 2017, by Alan at Ross Creek in 2016, but never where first banded in Helensburgh, or in Brockville where many tui sightings are made. So this tui is 10 years old.

- Learn about geophysiography, biodiversity monitoring and threat management from practising experts.

AAPES/Birds NZ and Town Belt Bird Count

AAPES/Birds NZ 5-minute bird count workshop and Town Belt Bird Count Sunday 30 July 10am to 12 noon followed by pizza lunch at Woodhaugh Garden.

This is the second event with AAPES university students following a successful time last year despite the weather. Our aim is to introduce the 5MBC methodology, Merlin and eBird apps, and the Town Belt Bird Count Trail (birdcount.nz website). We need volunteers from Birds NZ to help as we will divide into groups to walk sections of the Town Belt and do 5MBCs at the Bird Count Posts, and practise our bird identification skills.

We will meet at 10am at Prospect Park (just above Woodhaugh and off Lachlan Ave). It would be helpful if some members are happy to use their car to transport teams to various sections of the Town Belt and down to Woodhaugh afterwards for lunch.

Trip to Mt. Watkin/Hikaroroa - Saturday 17 June


It was a delight to join this trip to Mt Watkin/Hikaroroa, a 616m-high peak formed by an ancient volcanic vent approximately 40km north of Dunedin.



The group of 12 met at Woodhaugh Gardens and organised carpooling before heading north. After turning off SH1 before Waikouaiti we followed a winding but scenic gravel road to reach a ridge near the Mt Watkin peak. Here we were treated to superb panoramic views across to Karitane and the coast as well as the inland backcountry.



The 600ha reserve encompasses the slopes and gullies to the southwest of the peak, right down to the north branch of the Waikouaiti river. It is DCC land, managed by local iwi, and access requires permission. On arrival we were met by Aidan, a trapper with the Mammalian Corrections Unit and our expert guide to the site.




We split into three groups. The group I joined, led by Aidan, descended into a sheltered river gully and worked our way down rocky kowhai and regenerating broadleaf forest. Nearer the river we made our way through remnant old-growth podocarp forest with large totara and matai trees and beautiful hanging mosses.

Following trapping routes, we saw and heard many brown creeper, bellbirds, tomtits, fantails, silvereyes, as well as a few kereru.

Continuing our round trip, we climbed up the other side of the gully, again venturing through drier kowhai forest and then into kanuka forest, where many rifleman were heard but rarely seen. The other two groups focussed on the upper slopes, which are predominantly kanuka forest, where they saw or heard species such as bellbird, rifleman, and several tomtits. They also checked out a neighbouring farm track (with permission) that took them into Atlas square DU32 which had not received any visits so far during a winter season. They saw skylarks and finches including a flock of mixed redpoll, goldfinch, chaffinch and other unidentifiable passerines on the open pasture.

In the afternoon my group met the other groups up in the lower part of the kanuka forest and together followed an old farm track up to a grassy ridge, and then continued along the ridge back to the northwestern ridge and carpark.





This little-known reserve covers a rare, large tract of north Otago native forest with considerable biodiversity and a great deal of further conservation potential. Our thanks to Aidan for his expertise and guiding!

A number of the group stopped in at Hawksbury Lagoon on the return journey to Dunedin hoping to see the little egret. A large number of birds were observed as the light faded to the mid-winter sunset. These included black swan, australasian shoveller, royal spoonbill, a kotuku - and happily, the little egret.

According to eBird's Trip Report (thanks Richard), 19 bird species were seen or heard by us on Hikaroroa. Of these, the most common were native or endemic (50 bellbird/korimako, 34 brown creeper/pīpipi, 24 fantail/pīwakawaka, 23 tomtit/kōmiromiro, 17 silvereye/tauhou and 10 grey warbler/riroriro).


