Ornithological Snippets

2 Great Crested Grebes were at Kaikorai Lagoon on 18 August, with a single there on 9 September, while the regular bird was seen at Katiki Reservoir on 18 August & 3 September. 18 Takahe were released in the Greenstone Valley on 23 August, with further releases planned for October, and next year. 60 NZ Pigeon were counted at Makarora on 30 August. Bar-tailed Godwits numbered 290 at Blueskin Bay on 18 September. White Herons were reported from Kaikorai Estuary on 18 & 22 August, and 9 September, and from Karitane on 25 August. A Reef Heron flew across the harbour mouth to Taiaroa Head on 2 September, and a flock of 3 large white birds, possibly Cattle Egret, were seen near Dunedin Airport on 21 August. Finally a NZ Falcon has been seen regularly at Chain Hills at Invertiel.

Elsewhere the gaps are in relatively remote areas, so any visits here would be well appreciated. As ever, get in touch if you would like any specific suggestions for areas to visit, and please be careful.

Dawn Palmer ~ Otago Regional Representative

I started out in the field of applied ecology after completing a Diploma in Applied Science in Natural Resources in Adelaide. I worked for the Conservation Programmes Division of the South Australian Department of Environment and Heritage (surveying pastoral vegetation remnants across the State and Little Corella in the Flinders Ranges) before bridging up to a Bachelor in App. Sc. In Ecology/ Natural Resources in Canberra in 1987. After a summer contract with the CSIRO Wildlife Division, I backpacked my way around New Zealand in 1988 visiting several tracks that eventually came to form our first Great Walks. I then travelled on to Lake Tahoe, California and lived in the Sierra Nevada Mountains later in 1988. In 1990 found work with the Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit (USDA Forest Service) as a wildlife biologist surveying for California Spotted Owls. After a few years of "hooting" and habitat mapping for this species, I moved to New Zealand with my Kiwi fiancé and we've lived in Queenstown since early 1993. I found employment with the Department of Conservation in the Whakatipu Area as a Conservation Officer in 1994 and later became the Program Manager for Biodiversity "Assets" as it was known at the time.

I have been a self-employed independent ecologist based in Queenstown since 2002 while raising 2 children with my husband; our youngest is finishing her last year of High School this year. I've been a member of the OSNZ since 1998. After keeping an eye on the Australasian crested grebe on Lake Hayes with the late George Chance since 1995, I supported Rosalie Snoyik in coordinating the local effort of the George Chance Memorial Grebe Census in 2004, 2009, 2014 and will do it again for the 2024 census. I'm not yet a certified bander but I have recently registered with the Falcon banding system and have helped with some mohua, shrubland passerine, kea, fernbird banding work in the past.

As a Trustee of the Whakatipu Wildlife Trust since 2020, I've been working to introduce people to birding and enable our many community trapping groups to monitor the birds they want to protect. I'm also the ecologist (and soon to be Trustee) for the newly formed Tucker Beach Wildlife Trust who have a restoration & braided river bird protection focus. These efforts provide a wonderful segway and pairing of my interests in birding with BirdsNZ. I look forward to being involved in the many projects (e.g. bittern monitoring) and with the membership of BirdsNZ through my part in the shared Regional Representative role.

I am very grateful that the Regional Representative role will be shared and supported by other members of the existing BirdsNZ Otago Committee and willing members of BirdsNZ Otago. It is a testament to Mary's effort that a committee is needed to take on her role.

Mary is handing over RR role over the next few months and the transition has begun. Other committee and volunteer members will be continuing in their roles and with their projects.

Bird Flu

Members will be aware that high pathogenicity H5N1 avian influenza has spread rapidly across much of the world in recent years. This has resulted in the deaths of tens, if not hundreds, of thousands of wild birds, in particular seabirds including gulls, terns, shags and penguins. BirdsNZ members, especially beach patrollers, have an important role in surveillance.

If you find any unusual mortality events or see sick birds, especially those exhibiting neurological symptoms (for examples see: <u>https://photos.app.goo.gl/u9f3jpuy4SKQr1Lw9</u>) please **contact the MPI hotline 0800-809966 immediately**. As there is a potential risk

that bird flu may be transmitted to humans, please make sure you wait for instructions before handling any sick or dead birds.

Flagged South Island Pied Oystercatcher

A recent sighting makes a total of 12 flagged SIPO observed over the last few years. The majority of these observations have been on Warrington Bch with 7 yellow flagged and 1 red flagged birds. 27 observations of these 8 birds with one stand out, Yellow flag EP5, 15 sightings in total across July, Aug, Sept in 2021 then Jan, Feb, May, June and Dec in 2022 with no recent sightings.

Booming Bitterns and Cryptic Crakes

This is a major project that we will be involved in over the next few years. Otago Birds NZ has signed an agreement with ORC to survey Otago wetlands for presence of bitterns and crakes. There should be opportunities for many of us to take part, either in the field or analysing sound recordings at home and expenses will be fully reimbursed. This survey will be contributing to ORC's overall biodiversity monitoring.



Bittern survey fieldwork will commence in October and run through to December. We need people that have time to travel to wetlands to place automatic recorders in the wetlands and to return 3 weeks later to retrieve the SD cards, replace batteries and redeploy for a further 3 weeks. This may require walking on rough wet ground for up to 4 or 5 km, but mainly on the flat.

It would be great if we have teams of 3 or 4 people who can commit to looking after the survey of a particular wetland, so there is back-up of people who know where the recorders are located. From Valley Voice, Sept 2023 DEAR MARY OF BIRDS NZ

I was flicking through the latest edition of Valley Voice and surprisingly I found a letter addressed to me!

Please can members help Mary reply, with comments about falcon behaviour they have observed. Email <u>nzmaryt@gmail.com</u>

I was unable to attend your workshop in Dunedin on 18 June, but hope you will be interested in my encounter on 9 August with what I am sure was a juvenile falcon. I came upon it at dusk on a narrow bush path tearing into a recently killed wood pigeon, rather larger than itself.

It had a solid dark brown back with lighter speckled body, longish tail and no colour that I could see in the dusk. A short curved beak, quite tall legs, though they might have been extended by the tugging. When it finally acknowledged my presence some 10 metres off it chose not to fly, but to run awkwardly further along the path, alternately hopping and waddling. Rather like a kea.

When it finally took off it was more like a hop into the air, so that I couldn't see under the wings. It then hopped higher, vertically, with just a flutter of wings until it was well over my head, but too dark under the canopy to see the facial features except the small curved beak (no overlapping on the beak like keas). It made a series of 'kuk' sounds which were not quite like a blackbird.

We sat it out for about 20 minutes then it came down in hops and flutters, landing about the same distance away and proceeding an ungainly manner towards it prey. Punctuated by hops, but seemingly confident. As I had no camera with me and it grew increasingly dark and I left the gory scene after about 10 minutes.

Returning the next day at midday I ran into closer pile of wood-pigeon feathers, again about 10 metres from the original lot. The path was clear between the two piles, so it was not the original one dragged. Both carcasses had no bones left, but 1 wing on each, one still with meat attached.

High up in the trees was what I think the perpetrator, but it was surrounded by bellbirds and fantails and other small birds going about their business. The $T\bar{u}\bar{i}$ were all singing in the background. This bird looked the same as the night before, but was obviously not a threat. It was going 'kuk-kuk- kuk' like a blackbird, but not. And I could not see its beak profile in the high canopy. Eventually it flew away horizontally. I still couldn't see the wingspan in the canopy.

Now, this is not a bird I have met before, and it answers to the physical appearance of a juvenile bush falcon, but my trusted Falla/Simpson/Turbott makes no mention of the strange gait - stumbling, waddling, hopping - that made the encounter so unique. Can you comment? Islay Little
