Upcoming Aotea, Kawhia and Raglan Harbour Census 18-19 November

The harbour censuses have been a long standing tradition for the Branch for many decades and contribute to the BirdsNZ vision of encouraging the collection of bird data. They also support our international commitment with the Global Flyaway Network to monitor migratory birds found on the harbours.

The census is done 3 times a year:

- Late October/November
- February (contributes to a national and international shorebird census)
- June/July

The number of people taking part in the harbour census is dropping and we would like to build up a core group of people who can participate and learn as they go (if necessary). We encourage members to consider this opportunity to practice shorebirds ID and bird counting. You do not need to be a bird expert to participate and you will be supported by more experienced members. There is no cost involved to members and you get to experience some out of the way places. October Meeting Recap

Bruce Postill, Regional Representative for a number of years was farewelled and the incoming RR Jeanette Brooker chaired her first meeting. We wish Bruce well in his move to Christchurch.

Despite initial technological glitches 9 members were given a wonderful presentation via zoom by Ariel Hesswall as she discussed her research on seabird senses. It is good to see that a few of our members are finding the zoom option a way to attend meetings.



Some interesting points Ariel mentioned were:

- More than 25% of the world's seabird species are nocturnal
- King penguins have acute hearing to enable them to identify their chick in the colony
- Tube nosed birds such as albatrosses have very good smell and vision
- Researchers trying to entice birds to recolonise old nesting places are using nesting materials with seabird smells in them
- After measuring many bird skulls she found birds who have larger eyes and noses compared to body weight are more susceptible to bycatch
- Light attraction for seabirds is a world wide problem however if lights are changed from yellow to green, oil rigs have less collisions
- Volunteers in Auckland who collected light affected seabirds found:
 - 20-30% later died from internal bleeding and fractures.
 - o more males than females were found
 - o more juveniles than adults were affected
 - different affected seabirds were found in different areas e.g. black petrels were found mostly in rural areas
