The most exciting was when Stephen saw a Bonaparte Gull at Oare Marshes Nature Reserve in England. I just dipped out. Funnily enough, I had just told another birder about my bad luck in Denmark many years ago when I dipped out on a Terek sandpiper. I was a bit behind Stephen; he jumped up and down and I knew he had seen the Bonaparte Gull. I hurried to see it, but when I arrived the gull had just gone behind a sand bank. I waited for a long while, but it did not come back up.

Regional bird sightings

Here are the latest bird sightings from Neill Haggarty:

Fernbirds were heard and seen at the Koitiata reserve and on the Timber Trail.

A fantastic high count of 20 Nankeen Night Herons at Upokongaro has been made recently (see updates from Paul Gibson on next page).

A spotless crake was reported from a dune lake 2 km south of Hokio beach. It would be nice to know how to access this location!

A bittern was sighted near the Mangahou river on the Pahiatua track, exact location is unclear.

Finally, 4 Cattle Egret were seen and photographed in a field near the Ohau Estuary.

Updates from Paul Gibson, Whanganui

I continue my obsession with **kingfishers**, one of my favourite birds. On most visits, at low tide, I've encountered 3 – 6 birds flitting around from rock to log, mostly between Beach Road and the Sailing Club. Yesterday, Friday, I had Graham Guy with me, and we had great success. I'll let the pictures tell the story.



On several afternoon visits to Upokongaro, on sunny days, I've found up to nine **Nankeen night herons** out in the London Plane tree sunning themselves before having to head out for the night again. One afternoon Jim and I found one adult and four young birds fishing in the stream below the carport. The café closes at 3pm and we had to leave. I did manage some amazing pictures of the adult bird flying up from the water. On Thursday night (17th of July) Jim and I were out there after sunset and observed 20 birds departing from their day roost for the night on the river. This is the highest count we have ever had.



Jane and I had a walk around Virginia Lake one morning, and there are always good birds to see, shags, shovellers, grebes etc.

Upcoming meetings

Enderby - The Riviera of the Sub-Antarctic Isles

A falconer-turned-veterinarian, Bryony Griffiths has worked with many species from pygmy owls and peregrine falcons in the Canadian Rockies to New Zealand's own unique species like kea, kiwi, and kakī. She has spent her career working in different organizations in conservation of wildlife and public education. She recently started her Masters of Veterinary Studies and was presented with an opportunity to spend a quarter of a year in the remote sub-Antarctic islands monitoring NZ sea lion breeding colonies. There was no wasting a chance to observe some of the most unique and untouched landscapes as well as the plethora of avian life there.

The project is funded by Birds New Zealand's Pacific Islands Bird Conservation and Research Fund. Our team followed the trail of eyewitness accounts of grounded birds, as well as traditional knowledge and accounts from personal experiences.

Health and safety

Health and safety of Birds New Zealand's members when they participate in Birds NZ organised activity, like meetings, collection of data and fieldtrips, is important to the Council. The Health and Safety Policy can be found on Birds NZ webpage. Press Here to get to the policy.

To make it more practicable, the Council has developed <u>health and safety</u> guidelines for field trips that also can be found on the website.

The guidelines state: "At a health and safety briefing before a field trip commences the trip leader will describe the route, any specific or potential physical difficulties that might be encountered, and the approximate times for lunch, tea breaks and the end of the trip." (...)

"If a member has an allergy or medical condition, they should bring their own anti-histamines and personal medications. The trip leader should be advised of medical problems a member has and how to deal with them. Bring a mobile phone and share phone numbers with others. Don't hesitate to call 111 for any incidents involving injury." (...) "The trip leader should check the weather forecast for the day and, if necessary, monitor the weather conditions during the trip. Turn back if the weather deteriorates. Each member should bring sufficient food and drinking water for their personal needs."
