Ornithological Snippets

A Marsh Crake | Kotoreke at Lake Hayes on 1 and 2 August, was the first sighting there for 18 months. 2 Variable Oystercatcher | Tōrea pango feeding in a Balclutha paddock on 19 August were well inland for this species.

Banded Dotterel | Pohowera had returned to their breeding grounds near Tarras on 20 July and 4 Black-fronted Terns | Tarapirohe were at Tucker Beach, Queenstown on 16 July. A Reef Heron | Matuku moana was seen at Katiki Point on 29 July, while a long-staying White Heron | Kōtuku at Tomahawk Lagoon was joined by a second bird on 16 August.

Finally, there have been continued Kaka | Kākā reports at Kaitangata and Kaka Point, with further sightings near Balclutha and at Pounawea.

eBird News

I have spent recent dark evenings entering checklists from old notebooks into eBird. I won't mention how old some of these notebooks are, but there is a surprising amount of detail in some of the lists, from the days when we used pencil and paper instead of tapping a screen. Unfortunately, there is usually some aspect of what makes a complete checklist missing, in many cases either distance travelled or time spent watching. So most of these checklists have been entered as Historical, but there is still a wealth of information in some of them, and judging from the number of records that get flagged, it is interesting to see how bird populations have changed over the years, mainly down, but occasionally with sightings that were rare at the time, but now regular, if not common.

For some of my early overseas trips, lists were a bit vague, sometimes only a single list for the entire visit, so pinning a sighting to a particular date sometimes took a bit of detective work, including reading through old travel journals, and reviving memories at the same time. Nowadays, although I still try to keep a journal when travelling, it is more likely that my eBird lists act as a diary. If only I'd known 50 years ago that eBird was coming along!

Update on the Otago Bittern Project

It has been some time since an update was last provided on the Otago Region Bittern Project. This regional project is a partnership between Birds New Zealand Otago and the Otago Regional Council (ORC) to survey Australasian bitterns, marsh crakes, and spotless crakes in the wetlands of the Otago region. It was initiated in September 2022 with funding provisionally provided for 5 years. The ORC purchased Acoustic Recording Devices (ARDs) and has covered our expenses for transportation to and from monitoring locations, software purchase for analysis, workshop hosting costs, analysis time for digital spectrogram data, and administration of the funding agreement.




Figure 1: Legend: brown = inventory areas; yellow = recent incidental sightings received since 2022

This work is necessary as there has been no previous comprehensive assessment of the distribution and numbers of Bittern and Crake in Otago. The project uses ARDs to sample

at dawn and dusk, following a standardised protocol to gather sound files. Since the start of the project, we have collected data for the 2022, 2023 and 2024 breeding seasons. We plan to conduct further sampling in September, October, and November at multiple sites across Otago. Table 1 summarises the coverage and number of ARDs that we are managing. Sites are located throughout Otago as shown in Figure 1. This map shows sample sites and incidental sightings received since the project's commencement.

As of 31 March 2025, a total volunteer effort of 1,300 hours of work, including administration, deploying ARDs in the field, retrieving them, uploading data, curating data, and servicing ARDs. Additionally, we have developed partnerships with Te Nohoaka o Tukiauau, based at Sinclair Wetlands and Tiaki Maniototo in the Upper Taieri wetland complex, as well as the Forest and Bird Society in the Catlins, all of which have undertaken

After three years, we have a baseline collection of sound files from the most promising sites across Otago. Analysis of the sound files has been slow, but we have preliminarily confirmed the presence of bitterns in Sinclair Wetlands and Lake Tuakitoto.

To speed up processing, we have engaged contractors with support from DOC to undertake the initial sub-sampling and analysis of the sound files. The eventual results will give us a first look at where booming bitterns can be confirmed. In addition to being part of the project objectives, this data will enable us to identify priority sites for the 2025 season. As this contract progresses, we will be able to share updates on the location of bitterns in Otago, allowing their conservation to be better supported.



Thanks to our committee, Mary Thompson, Francesca Cunninghame, Catriona Gower, and Ela Hunt, and to all the people who have put out and retrieved ARDs throughout Otago, the landowners who have given access, and to the ORC, which has funded this work.

Birds Otago August meeting: Breeding sites and success for Canterbury kautuku/bitterns - Peter Langlands & AGM

Benham Seminar Room, Department of Zoology - 7:30pm Tuesday 26th August 2025

Our speaker Peter Langlands has had an interest in the cryptic Australasian bittern / kautuku since 2005, and has been involved in the creation of a national bittern database alongside DOC which revealed the species had rapidly declined in range and number, giving it a threat status of 'Nationally Critical'. With a focus on Canterbury, Peter has developed a strategy to photo-ID individuals and use trail cameras to monitor breeding success with exciting results. Sharing footage through social media is an important part in raising awareness of bittern conservation, and Peter looks forward to presenting key findings from this research thus far.




Chatham Island Bird Tours
