

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CLASSIFIED NOTES IN NEXT ISSUE.—Members are reminded that classified notes will be published in the January issue. BANDING OF TASMANIAN MUTTON-BIRDS.—In the course of a population study of the Tasmanian mutton-bird or short-tailed shearwater (Puffinus tenuirostris) conducted jointly by the Council for Industrial and Scientific Research and Tasmanian Fauna Board last March at Flinders Island area, a considerable number of birds was banded. The rings are of copper and bear the following inscription with a serial number: "Notify Fauna Board, Hobart, Tasmania, Australia." Remains of this species commonly occur on east Australian beaches between September and January and members in a position to do so are asked to keep a careful watch out for marked birds during the coming season. New Zealand ornithologists are also asked to keep a look-out. Recovered bands should be returned to the C.S.I.R., 314 Albert Street, East Melbeurne, C.2, Victoria; or Fauna Board, Police Department, Hobart, Tasmania.
