#### **Karitane Seabirds**

Some 1-2 km out of Karitane on 23 January 2005, attracted to large lumps of frozen sharks liver were:

Southern Royal Albatross 2 White-capped Mollymawk ~10, all adults Buller's Mollymawk 1 Cape Pigeon ~10 Sooty Shearwater ~3 Hutton's Shearwater ~3 Black-backed, Red-billed and 1juv Black-billed Gulls White-fronted Terns


In addition behind a returning fishing boat there were hundreds of White-capped Mollymawks, again mostly adult but including some immature birds, ~100 White-chinned Petrels accompanied by at least 2 Westland Black Petrels (which came close enough to see the dark tip to the bill) and a fair number of Sooty Shearwaters and Cape Pigeons. We only saw Hutton's Shearwaters off Karitane but there were both Hutton's and Fluttering off the end of Aramoana Mole on 24 January 2005.



#### Waders from Blueskin Bay

**Bar-tailed Godwits** at Blueskin Bay increased to 797 on 14 Jan 2005 and there was still at least one orange-flagged bird. A **New Zealand Dotterel** was roosting with the **Banded Dotterels** at the end of Warrington Spit on the 29 Dec 2004 and 16 Jan 2005, and I have drawn them (below). This record is the first for Otago for many years, probably since they were exterminated from the South Island breeding sites.

Fair, big lead, big eye, long bid. At least half as big again as they Banded Dotts will which it roosted and fed. Overall looked grey rather than brown above and while below. Wingbar only briefly seen (white, broadest on nine primaries 24 order secondaries.

#### **Bar-tailed Godwit Survey**

On the 6th February 2005 we counted **Godwits** at most of the larger high tide roosts in coastal Otago. A total of 1753 birds were seen of which 3 had flags on their tibia.

Orange flags are birds banded in Victoria, Australia any time after the early 1990's! The White over Black bird was banded in Chongming, China in the last two years.

Coloured flags have been used on waders for over a decade or so and compared with colour bands are a lot easier to see although it would help if **Godwits** could be encouraged to keep both feet firmly on the ground when roosting. In recent years **Godwits** have been flagged from Siberia south along the migration route in eastern Asia to their wintering grounds in Australia and New Zealand. Flag colours from overseas are:



#### **Ornithological Snippets**

Tim Cotter provided this photo of an albino **Blue Penguin** he observed feeding in the Otago Harbour on 31/12/2004. The bird was easy to follow from the coastline because of its white colour underwater. Interestingly, **White-fronted Terns** and **Black-backed Gulls** kept harassing it every time it surfaced.



On 6/2/2005 Derek Onley saw an adult female Chestnut-breasted Shelduck on the Warrington Sewage Pond along with 20 or so Paradise Shelduck. As he walked past, all but the resident pair of Paradise Duck and their 6 young flew off into the fog.

Graeme Loh reports that an English tourist reported a sighting of a small raptor on his way between Kurow and Duntroon on 15/1/2005 just after midday. The tourist described it as small and, having looked at the old field

guide, thought it was a **Nankeen Kestrel**. As he was driving along, it was hovering in the wind, but not doing the distinctive kestrel fast-flapping hover. He stopped the car and put his binoculars on it and had a short view of it as it dropped out of view into rank pasture about 15m away. Unfortunately, he was not able to observe it any more as he was not safely parked and had to move on. The man saw mostly the underside and rump, both of which he reported as being white, as was its head. Graeme says he is not completely convinced, knowing **Nankeen Kestrels** well. In particular, the observer did not comment on the bird being colourful, which the **Nankeen Kestrel** is in comparison to NZ raptors. Nevertheless, there might be something odd out there!

Derek Onley found an immature **Fiordland Crested Penguin** at Aramoana on 10/2/2005, looking to moult near the pie/coffee cart. He steered it back to sea away from the dogs. Hopefully it moulted in a safer place like the Albatross colony.

On the evening of 29/12/2004 Alan Baker saw a NZ Falcon at Shag Point. The following day and on 1/1/2005, he saw a Pied Shag at Kakanui, part of a resting group of four shag species; Pied, Spotted, Black and Little. There are few records of this species in Otago.

On 22/12/2004, at Turner's Creek near Kinloch. Louise Foord stopped beside a derelict farmhouse. She had previously known of a nesting **Falcon** in the area. There were two **Falcons** in a dead tree by the bridge on the roadside, one of which had some food item in its feet. She walked up to the first clearing and sat watching the juvenile **Falcon**, which had flown onto a low branch. She was able to sit very close while it poked its beak into its wing and shoulders. It raised its claws for a

scratch. It watched her and after over 15 minutes it flew to a nearby tree. **Tomtits** and **Robins** were also present.

Peter Schweigman received a message that there was a **Black Stilt** at the Brighton beach on 29/12/2004. This was followed up and one totally black one turned up on 22/1/2005, again on the beach.



In Waipori Gorge on 30/1/2005, Derek Onley heard and got a fleeting glimpse of a native parakeet. It sounded like a **Yellow-crowned** and he got the impression it was to small for **Red-crowned** but he saw it only briefly in flight as it shot off downstream.

On 3/2/2005, from the wharf at Port Chalmers, Louise Foord saw Welcome Swallows, which nest under the wharf, Black-billed Gulls, a dark Stewart Island Shag and, most exciting to her, a Little Blue Penguin swimming about.

Wendy Hare, Suzanne Schofield and Richard Schofield came across a pair of Cirl **Buntings** in Cromwell on 21/1/2005. They were alongside the river/lake between the Junction lookout and the Old Town. They hadn't previously heard any reports from this part of the country.
