Ornithological Snippets

2 Chukar were reported from Isthmus Peak on 7 October. 3 Wrybill|Ngutu pare were at Warrington Spit 2 October, while a **Red Knot**|Huahou was seen at Aramoana on 16 October. Continuing White Heron|Kōtuku were at Glenorchy & Andersons Bay Inlet on 27 September.

An **Australasian Little Grebe**|**Tokitokipio** was resighted at Glenorchy Lagoon on 18 October, and a **Kaka** was at Lake Hayes on 16 October. 2 **NZ Fernbird**|**Mātātā** were discovered in the Matukituki Valley 20 September. Finally, an impressive flock of **Yellowhammer**|**Hurukōwhai n**ear Arrowtown 19 September numbered 210.

Bittern matuku-hūrepo project


The five-year project, funded by Otago Regional Council and led by the Otago Branch of Birds New Zealand, has enjoyed collaborative support from the Department of Conservation (DOC), Forest and Bird, Te Nukuroa o Matamata, Tiaki Maniototo and landowners and community groups across the region. As we enter the 4th monitoring season, we can report that male bitterns have been recorded in the Catlins, Sinclair Wetlands, Lake Tuakitoto and Akatore in Coastal Otago. They have also been detected in the Maniototo in Central Otago, near Glenorchy, including the Glenorchy Lagoon, and in the Whakatipu Basin. This year, we will be monitoring bittern in the Catlins and continuing our inventory efforts in the Matukituki Valley, Maniototo, several of the Coastal Otago wetlands, with some new sites up in the Waitaki catchment.

Forest and Bird, with the support of Francesca Cunnighame and new member Catriona Gower, have organised matuku muster activities in the Catlins, and Dawn Palmer has assisted members of the Wai Wanaka group in their participation at wetlands in the Wanaka area. Conditions for the October listening were not ideal; no bitterns were heard, but marsh crakes were heard at Catlins Lake and MacLennan Wetlands. Hopefully, we'll have better luck in the November matuku muster events. Contact birds.otago@birdsnz.org.nz if you'd like to join a matuku muster.

Inland Birding

On Tuesday, 14 October, 50 Mohua Yellowheads were caught on overflowing predator-free Anchor Island and transferred to the West Matukituki Valley, where there is extensive pest trapping. You can

Meanwhile, the Whakatipu birding group has been getting their eye in for Sacred kingfisher/ Kōtare this spring. Here is a map showing where this hole-nesting species has been heard. We're yet to confirm nests, although we thought we had one on the Arrow River earlier in the season. Kōtare migrate into the area in spring.

The Kotuku in Glenorchy is in breeding condition. Skin around the bill and eyes was quite blue, the photo portrays the colour seen well. Tibia pink. No plumes seen.

The count of red-billed gulls might seem high. But the table shows that in past surveys numbers of red-billed gulls in spring can be as high as the current count.

You might say that apart from March 1978 there has been little variation in the overall pattern for these species but as we know black billed gulls have dropped right out of the count.

Thanks for the efforts to keep the numbers of small gulls to a minimum and taking the time to look for red-billed gull. For the mallards; it would be good in future to receive notes that justify this, ie clear identification of green headed males etc.

In response to questions, I recommend that you take your time to get maximum coverage. I think coverage is more important than finishing in a hurry.

The next survey is scheduled for 19 October starting at 13:10.

At this stage I've got a gap for Section 1. Can everybody else confirm that they are available or what Plan B might look like.

On another matter: Don't forget that I'm talking about the Harbour Survey at the October Birds NZ Meeting (Benham Seminar Room 28 October 7:30 pm). I should have done this before we started so you can see the backstory, but the talk slots were booked up.

White Heron



This photo of a white heron was taken at Brighton on 17 January 2023 by Bram Evans. He contacted me wondering whether it is 'tool 'use. "This bird was looking for prey in the stream that runs across the beach, and – quite by chance – one of my photos shows it dropping a stone into the water, presumably hoping to flush out any fish that might be hiding among the weeds.

Is this a known behaviour? I have found references to the use, by green herons, of small items (insects, twigs, bread) as floating bait to attract fish, but cannot find any mention of the use of stones by herons, in the manner seen here."

Has anyone seen anything similar?

Our Catlins team will be monitoring bittern detected over the past three years of the project. Franny Cunningham and Catriona Gower will be organising Matuku Muster active listening events over the full moon phase 7, 8, 9 November.

Franny has booked accommodation over the weekend in the Forest & Bird Lenz Reserve Accommodation so please confirm your place directly with Franny francescacunninghame@gmail.com

Lenz Reserve is located 5km south of Papatōwai at 614 Chaslands Highway, where the bridge goes over the Fleming River. It is shared bunk room accommodation and costs are covered by this collaborative bittern project which is supporting participation in Matuku Muster (Thanks ORC, BirdsNZ Otago).

No need to commit to the whole weekend. Any count effort is valuable.

We will be deploying acoustic recording devices into the wetlands of the Matukituki Valley, Maniototo area and a few sites in Coastal Otago.

Discover what happened to materials from the 1925 International South Seas Exhibition. There will be a talk about materials used from the exhibition, most of which can be viewed. You will also be able to see the restored Married Quarters Aotearoa/ New Zealand's only two-storied wooden quarantine building, which remains on its original site. This is the last remaining building of the 1870's quarantine station, a prominent two-storied building that once housed families in quarantine. The restoration project was awarded The Southern Heritage Trust 'Dave Cox Memorial Award' in 2019.
